Himanshu Verma



An arts curator and facilitator, Himanshu Verma is the founder of Red Earth (www.redearthindia.com), a New Delhi based independent arts organisation that works with Indian contemporary visual art as well as diverse forms of cultural expression, started in 2004. Himanshu Verma's engagement with the arts has taken various shapes, and an enriching involvement in informally studying and engaging with arts practice across disciplines had lead to the eclectic, multiple referenced nature of his work.

Red Earth engages with art in all its manifestations – visual art, music, dance, theatre, film, design, and more; breaking down boundaries of folk, classical, modern, popular and others in a unique celebration of culture in India.

Under the banner of Red Earth, Himanshu curates exhibitions, visual art projects, and art festivals. His curatorial work engages with diverse themes and narratives, such as celebrating Indian seasons and festivals with contemporary art exhibitions and festivals, which forms a large part of his work, as well as other themes like masculinity, and contemporary Indian urban culture.

Himanshu has also received critical acclaim, public adoration and people's blessings for reviving traditional Indian festivals and the aspects of lived culture associated with them in the city of Delhi, for example, the festivals of Basant Panchami, Holi, Chaiti, Hariyali Teej and Diwali.

Inspired by the Indian aesthetic, Himanshu aims to make the arts a community affair, which are organically tied to a whole way of life, the seasons cycle and nature, festivals. That is why Red Earth exhibitions and festivals go beyond just that to be experiences. In this process, he has also succeeded significantly in taking art out of its wine and cheese confines.

As an artist, he is involved in multi-media collaborative art projects as well as performance art projects that contextualise performance very differently from as it is understood in the contemporary visual art context.

Himanshu Verma is also a freelance researcher and writer, and an arts facilitator and event co-ordinator. While my academically oriented works focusses on themes of gender, sexuality, modernity and popular culture, the non-academic journalistic work engages with a range of themes and topics, most prominently art and music.

Himanshu Verma is a bit of a clotheshorse and absolutely loves the Saree, it is his humble to effort to celebrate and keep alive the glory of this most wondrous Indian garment, and he would like to extend an open invitation to Men to start dressing up in Sarees on a regular basis!
